
SERVERS WANTED!

Getting to Know our Priest: Father Sergii

Below we are given a few paragraphs describing Father Sergii's life.

Having concluded my studies in Christ the Saviour Seminary in Johnstown, PA, I was ordained priest on the feast of Ascension in 2001 by His Eminence Nicholas, Metropolitan of Amissos. Following my ordination, I was assigned to a parish in rural Pennsylvania. It was an old church -- by American standards -- the temple was over 90-years-old, while the priest's house even older. So there we lived with my matushka and little Ivan for four years. At the time the area where we lived was suffering from economic depression and, on visiting it again a couple of years ago, we saw that the decline has only deepened.

In 2005 I was transferred to a parish in Northwest Indiana -- virtually a Chicago suburb. It was there that our two daughters were born. In 2013 I was assigned to a parish north of Miami, FL, only to find ourselves in St Louis twelve months later.

While still living in Indiana, I remember seeing once in a while our rector Archpriest Martin in the altar of the Holy Protection Cathedral in Chicago. Yet, we were not introduced to one another, despite having very close mutual friends. When Archbishop Peter was talking about assigning me to St Louis, I remember him saying that St Basil's is one of the best parishes with a wonderful rector and a good parish community.

Our family's move to St Louis coincided with the beginning of the construction of the new temple. As we know, every good endeavor is accompanied by temptations. Those who were involved in the construction of the new temple experienced this truism fully. Fr Martin used to joke to me: "Before you came we had no problems", leaving it to me to decide whether the cause of the problems was I or the construction of the temple.

Besides helping Father Martin in the parish, in 2014 I was appointed a secretary of the

Diocesan Spiritual Court and am still carrying on this obedience.

I love history, especially so the history of the Church, with the emphasis on the life of the Church in the recent times. It is humbling to see what spiritual giants came before us, but even we are members of the same Body Christ -- the Holy Orthodox Church. Our time is also included as a chapter into the Book of the History of the Church. We look around and see those who are partakers of the grace of God, as well as those who become instruments of the enemy, the fallen angel.

Christ said: "When the Son of Man cometh, shall He find faith on the earth?" We can fall away from the Truth with the rest of the world, or remain with Him as sheep of His little flock, those who are faithful to Him and His Holy Church to the very end.

St. Symeon's Prophecy ExplainedExcerpt from The Feasts of the Lord: The Meeting of Christ

No sooner had Symeon received Christ in his embrace than he exclaimed: "Lord, now lettest Thou thy servant depart in peace, according to thy word; for my eyes have seen thy salvation which thou has prepared before the face of all people, a light to lighten the Gentiles and the glory of thy people Israel". This is a magnificent expression, which the Church has taken over and placed at the end of the Vespers service, as well as in other services, such as the Thanksgiving after Holy Communion of the Holy Gifts.

The righteous Symeon had been informed by the Holy Spirit that he would certainly see the incarnate Word of God before he died, and this had been accomplished because he was "favoured with the prophetic grace". When he saw Christ, his soul sought release from his body ... and therefore [did] not fear death.

"In peace, according to thy word" indicates that he is looking for his soul's departure from his body "because of the prophecy which he received" and he regards it as a rest, because "in peace" is equivalent to "in rest". The rest is also related to peace from thoughts, because as long as the days pass, righteous Symeon is waiting for it, "always thinking about when He will come". And of course God's salvation is the incarnation, which God was preparing before all ages. Actually, He was preparing the mystery of Christ "even before the beginning of the world".


The incarnation of the Son and Word of God was also a light for the Gentiles, since the pagans, the idol-worshippers, had gone astray, were in darkness and had fallen into the hands of the demons, as well as the glory of Israel, because Christ arose and stemmed from the Israelites. So all who are grateful feel this.

These words of St. Symeon are a triumphal hymn after the revelation to him of the incarnate Son and Word of God. The Old Testament Prophets saw the back of God, His coming, which would happen in the future, but he sees His face. Christ really is the light of the world, not the sensible and ethical light, not the symbolic, but the real light, which drives away the darkness of ignorance and of the nous [spirit], but is also a glory not only of the Israelites, but of human nature altogether. Without Christ and apart from

Him human nature is inglorious, formless, vague and anonymous. With Christ it acquires "form and definition".

The fact that no sooner had St. Symeon seen the incarnate Word of God than he sought release, death, is interpreted as the great joy over what he was to do next. He wanted to journey to Hades and make known the joyous news that the Messiah, the Redeemer of the world and of the righteous men of the Old Testament who were in Hell, had come. Christ satisfies this request, because, as St. Athanasios the Great says, it seems that he told him to go and appear joyously to Adam, who was living dismally in Hades, and make the joy known to Eve in her pains, saying: "Redemption has come, the saviour has come; forgiveness has come, the deliverer has come. Human nature, weep no longer, for your helper is coming and will not delay".

Therefore righteous Symeon was the first to announce to the prisoners in Hades, to all the righteous of the Old Testament, who were in Hades, for death had not been abolished ontologically, that the Christ had come Whom they awaited, and that He would also come swiftly to Hades to release them.
