Ask Your Priest

What was Jesus Christ doing during the three days in the tomb? Also, why did the Body of Jesus Christ not decay while He was in the tomb?

We are taught that after his death on the

cross that Christ descended into Hades. (1 Peter 3:18-21)There he preached to those who had died offering them freedom from their captivity. He did not merely descend into Hades, He invaded and conquered it, vanquishing the devil and demons, smashing the gates and breaking their locks and bolts as we see in the Icon of the Resurrection. The intent of this imagery is to show that Christ descends not as a victim, but as a victor and liberator over death and those held in Hades. Before him the power of death is powerless. Christ offers the hope of liberation from their torment to all those who have fallen into the abyss and release of all of those held there.

Christ's body did not corrupt during His three days in the tomb because he is the fulfillment of the law and the prophets and the prophet David prophesized that God will not allow "...Your Holy One to see corruption". (Psalm 15:10 and Acts 2:22)

Welcoming Melinda (Mindy) Momeyer

On April 20th, we welcomed Mindy Momeyer to the Orthodox Church through Chrismation. We also welcome her with open arms to our parish here at St. Basil's. In order to get to know her better, we've asked her the following questions with her responses recorded.

Where are you from?

I grew up just outside of Erie, Pennsylvania.

Why did you move to St. Louis?

I moved to St. Louis to attend Washington University's Doctor of Physical Therapy Program. It was a difficult decision to move so far from home, but WashU's stellar reputation in the PT world made the decision easier. I am so glad to be here.

What brought you to Orthodoxy?

I started attending Orthodox Liturgy and Lenten services sporadically with my boyfriend, Maxim, over a year ago while still belonging to the Roman Catholic Church. I was moved by the beauty and reverence of the services as well as the history and Tradition of the Church. His family invited me to Pascha last year, and the service moved me to tears. Afterwards I began exploring Orthodoxy through various books and continuing to attend Vespers and Liturgy. When I moved to St. Louis, I decided to join an Orthodox Church and become a catechumen.

Is anyone else in your family Orthodox? No. My immediate family and my mother's family are Roman Catholic, while my father and his family are Protestant.

What is the reason for choosing your patron saint?

St. Jude Thaddeus is considered the patron saint of hopeless cases, particularly in western churches, and for that reason as a teenager I chose him as my confirmation saint in the Catholic church. I have been asking for the intercession of St. Jude for years already, and because he is also an Orthodox Saint I decided it was fitting for me to keep him as my Orthodox patron. I appreciate the humility of his story and the wisdom in his epistle.

What is your favorite thing about being Orthodox?

It is so difficult to narrow down one thing that I enjoy most about the Church. What stuck out to me from the first time I entered an Orthodox Church was how Orthodox Worship engages all of the senses - touch, taste, sound, smell, and sight - giving one a sense of "fullness," even if one knew nothing of the Faith.

What are you most excited about in your new Orthodox life?

I am excited to continue to learn and grow in the Faith, read about the lives of the Saints, and be a part of the parish community.

Do you have any plans to serve the church in some capacity?

I am currently a singer in the choir, and I plan to continue to do so.
