# Fortieth Anniversary of St. Basil the Great Orthodox Church in St. Louis

On the Fifth Sunday of Pascha, His Eminence Gabriel, Archbishop of Montreal and Canada, visited St. Basil the Great Orthodox Church, thus marking the 40th anniversary of the parish.

The initial plan was for the archbishop to arrive earlier on Saturday, May 17th, but his flight got canceled and he was able to arrive at St. Basil's only towards the end of the Vigil.

On Sunday morning, upon Archbishop Gabriel's arrival he was presented flowers by the children and was greeted by the parish warden Andrew Johnstone with the traditional bread and salt.



Since our parish has not witnessed the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy for several years, many of our parishioners saw it for the first time. And there were

things to see: the Meeting of the Hierarch, with the priests lined up in the narthex in their ryasas, the deacons all in a row censing the hierarch and reciting the prescribed prayers for all to hear, and the choir singing majestically, thus enveloping the deacons' words with the hymnody.

Then Archbishop Gabriel entered the nave and proceeded to the amvon where he and the priests listened to the Entrance Prayers read by the cathedral Protodeacon Alexander Kichakov. After this, our archpastor took his place on the kathedra – a small platform in the middle of the church. There we all could see him being vested by the protodeacon and the altar servers, while





another protodeacon was reading the Vesting Prayers, St. Basil's Deacon Ephraim was censing, and two junior deacons flanked them with dikiri and trikiri.

During the Sixth Hour, Seth Williams, the parish warden of St. Justin's Mission in Cape Girardeau, was led up to the archbishop and was tonsured by him a Reader and subsequently ordained a Subdeacon for St. Justin's Mission.



Celebrating the Divine Liturgy alongside of Archbishop Gabriel were Archpriests John Whiteford (rector of St. Jonah's parish in Spring, TX) and Sergii Alekseev (St. Basil's rector), Priests Zachary Rose (rector of Sts. Peter and Fevronia parish in Kansas City, KS) and Thomas Nichols (St. Basil's Church), Protodeacons Alexander Kichakov (Holy Virgin Protection Cathedral, Des Plaines, IL) and Nikifor Franklin (Nativity of the Mother of God parish in Albany, NY), Deacons Ephraim Galloway (St. Basil's Church), Stephen Zelesnik (St. John the Theologian Mission in New Roads, LA) and Ivan Alekseev (St. Basil's Church).

As we all were praying at the Liturgy, we could see how some parts of the Hierarchical Liturgy differ from what we are used to. The archpastor remains in the middle of the nave from the beginning of the Liturgy until the Small Entrance. The senior priest took a blessing from him to begin the Liturgy, entered the altar and gave the exclamation: "Blessed is the Kingdom of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit always, now and ever and unto the ages of ages!" After the Litany of Peace, the hierarch blessed the second priest to enter the altar and to proclaim the exclamation after the first Small Litany. During the singing of the second Antiphon, the remaining priests received a blessing to enter the altar.

During the Small Entrance, the clergy proceeded out of the altar, lined up on either side of the hierarch and entered the altar following him and singing the Entrance Hymn, which the choir repeated as the clergy sang it for the second time already in the altar.

It is worth noting that during the Hierarchical Liturgy the Royal Doors remain open for a long time and are closed only after the singing of the Lord's Prayer.

After the Great Entrance, Deacon Stephen Zelesnik was brought up into the middle of the nave and from there was escorted into the altar where Archbishop Gabriel ordained him to holy priesthood to guide St. John the Theologian Mission in New Roads, LA. We could see how the man who was living his last minutes as a deacon was led thrice around the Holy Altar Table by his



Dean, Fr. John Whiteford, accompanied by the singing of the clergy and the choir. He was stripped of his deacon's orarion and vested in priestly vestments, with every article, before being put on him, being presented to the faithful by the hierarch who proclaimed "Axios" ("worthy" in Greek), which again was sung by the clergy and then the choir. Once ordained, Fr. Stephen took his place with other priests around the Holy Altar Table.

After the Consecration of Gifts, Subdeacon Daniel Simpson was bought to the middle of the nave and was escorted into the altar to be ordained to the diaconate. The ordination to the diaconate is very similar to the ordination to the priesthood. It also includes being led around the Holy Altar Table, this time by the cathedral protodeacon. Newly-ordained Deacon Daniel was vested in diaconal vestments, with every



new article being accompanied by "Axios". Finally, he was given the liturgical fan and positioned on the north side of the Holy Altar Table to fan the Holy Gifts. It goes without saying that this ordination was experienced quite differently by the clergy and the faithful of St. Basil's, since it is our Daniel, and he will be serving as a deacon in our church.

After this ordination, the Divine Liturgy continued in a familiar fashion. It is worth noting that our choir sang beautifully under the leadership of Carol Surgant. During communion of the clergy, our youth choir, under direction of Melinda Westervelt, sang the Exapostilarion of Pascha. Holy Communion was administered



from three chalices (it must have been the first instance of this at St. Basil's), with Archbishop Gabriel distributing Communion from the center of the amyon.

At the end of the Divine Liturgy, a Gramota from the First Hierarch of the Russian Church Abroad (read by Protodeacon Alexander) was presented to St. Basil's choir director Carol Surgant for her "noteworthy efforts on behalf of St. Basil the Great parish in St Louis ... and the worldwide



Orthodox Christian English-speaking community." Metropolitan Nicholas stresses in the Gramota, that the recipient has been "an unending font of Liturgical information for clergymen, singers, and the laity ... first at St. John Chrysostom parish and now for many years at St. Basil the Great parish."

Another Gramota, this time from the Diocese of Chicago and Mid-America, signed by Archbishop Gabriel, was presented to St. Basil's parish.

After the Divine Liturgy, the festivities spilled into the parish hall and outdoors – under our huge tent, where the tables were set for the clergy and the faithful. We were blessed with beautiful weather – a rare treat for St. Basil's community during major celebrations. The parish Sisterhood and the trapeza team prepared a great variety of delicious dishes, while a small choir treated the guests to a choice selection of church hymns and folk songs, sung in English, Georgian, and Russian.

Many hours of work were put into preparation of this celebration, with some elements of planning changing at the last moment. The church and the narthex were scrubbed, candlestands were polished, wax drops were ironed out of the carpets, mulch was spread under the tent to prevent the appearance of muddy puddles, the tent was put back in shape after a major storm, and so on and so forth. We are grateful to all our hard workers and benefactors.



#### Deacon Ordained for St. Basil's

Subdeacon Ivan Alekseev was ordained to the holy diaconate by Archbishop Gabriel on May 6th at St. George Russian Orthodox Church in Cincinnati, Ohio. Several parishioners from St. Basil's traveled to Cincinnati to witness the ordination, which took place during the patronal feast services of St. George's parish. The celebration was filled with joy and reverence, marking a meaningful moment in the life of the newly ordained. Ivan is the son of Fr. Sergii, the rector of St. Basil's, and his ordination is a blessing not only for his family but for the entire parish of St. Basil's. We pray that God will grant him many years of faithful service in his new ministry.






#### Thanksgiving Gramota Text
